

George Frederick Robinson

Funeral service was held in St. Andrew's Anglican Church, Rosetown, on Saturday, Dec. 1st, for the late George Frederick Robinson, aged 74 years. Mr. Robinson passed away in Brockville, Ont., very suddenly while attending St. Peter's Church, in Brockville, on Sunday, Nov. 25th.

Born in London, England, he came to Rosetown in 1909, and resided here until 1945, when he retired to live at Brockville, Ont. He was interested always in community affairs and was a faithful member of St. Andrew's Church choir while living in Rosetown. He held a 25-year jewel, presented to him by the Odd Fellows Lodge at Brockville many years ago, although he had not transferred to the Rosetown Lodge. He was a member of the Canadian Legion, and served his country in the Boer War and in World War I.

Rev. M. R. Neas conducted the funeral service and a choir under the direction of Mrs. G. Staples was in attendance. Hymns sung by the congregation were "We Love the Place, O God" and "The Lord Be With Us." E. H. Wickett was the usher in the church.

Members of the Canadian Legion, Rosetown, were in attendance, forming a guard of honor as the flag-draped casket was borne from the church to the funeral coach following the church service. At the Rosetown Cemetery, where interment was made in the family plot, the impressive Legion rites were observed under the direction of Comrade George Leith, president, and Rev. A. Alfred, chaplain. Reveille and Last Post were sounded by Bugler Wm. Heartwell.
